

I. GENERAL INFORMATION

Origin of Barangay Name. According to stories by old folks, Gumatdang got its name from the word *sha-shangan* which means "a place for drying meat".

In the olden times, a wealthy man named Pacalso from Amlimay, Buguias, Benguet migrated and settled in Bua, Tuding. His main livelihood was raising cattle and he was able to raise many heads. Because of the huge number of his cows, he butchered some for a feast and distributed pieces of meat to the people of the community. Then they would clean the surroundings for them to hang and dry the meat under the sun for future consumption. This was their means of preserving their meat to avoid spoilage.

Time passed by and Pacalso's men, whenever they were asked where they are going, they would reply, "undawak shi Sha-shangan" (I'm going to Sha-shangan), referring to the place where they hang and dry their meat. Due to varying pronunciations and connotations, they opted to adopt the contraction of Sha-shangan into 'Kumashangak'. The place was then named 'Kumashang' and eventually became Gumatdang.

Early Settlers. The following table contains the names of families which are known to be the first settlers in the area. It also shows the order of entry of the different ethnic groups into the barangay.

Location:

Barangay Gumatdang is located at the northwest part of Itogon. It is bounded by Barangay Tuding to the north, Barangay Virac to the south, Barangay Ucab to the east, and Baguio City to the west.

The municipal hall is located 17 kilometers away from the barangay with reference point at Turning Point – Mill Site. The Provincial Capitol in La Trinidad is 21 kilometers away, while the city of Baguio is 15 kilometers away from the barangay.

B. Trade and Industry

Mining. Itogon, being a host to the country's premier gold mining companies is classified by national classification as a first class municipality.

Mining remains as the top economic earner despite the closure of big mining companies in the past decade. The recent surge of the price of gold has revived the mining industry. Small-scale mining operations currently prevail over the abandoned quarries of the big companies that have earlier ceased operations.

Small-scale mining, however, does not contribute directly to the municipal treasury through existing taxation instruments. It however provides widespread employment and precipitates secondary economic derivatives that emanate from the capital dynamics of the gold enterprise.



B. Transport Infrastructure and Transportation Facilities

Roads. There is only one existing barangay road in the locality as per Municipal Planning Development Office (MPDO) recent records. The Gumatdang barangay road has a total length of 4.910 kilometers and width of 4-5 meters. The surface of the road is made of concrete. Only 0.835 is earth filled.

The barangay is accessible to any types of light vehicles, however, majority of the transport services being used are non – motorized and have irregular trips. All sitios are also accessible thru foot paths all year around.


